NEW BUSINESS

VERIZON

Verizon has unveiled their public safety private core and pre-emption and mobile broadband priority services designed to enhance our industry-leading 4G LTE network for public safety.

The public safety private core separates data traffic of public safety mobile users from commercial users across Verizon's 4G LTE network. The service works with our existing Wireless Priority Service to transmit the voice, data and Internet. Preemption allows Verizon to automatically reallocate network resources from commercial data/Internet users to first responders in the unlikely event network capacity is reached. Both MBP and preemption service will be offered at no additional charge for public safety customers.

These new services are available for public safety agencies now. Other public safety cores are still being tested.

We have 2.5 million square miles of 4G LTE coverage in the US. That's more than 400,000 square miles more than their closest competitor.

Verizon stated that 98% of their sites stayed operational during Hurricane Harvey. And why during Hurricane Irma, while other carriers celebrated the use of much needed preemption service offerings, we celebrated the fact that we didn't have to use these services to maintain connectivity for first responders. Verizon did not have to rely on priority access or preemption because of our superior network capacity.

So to be released products and services for public safety will include an application developer ecosystem and mission critical push-to-talk services.

FAQ'S:

I am a Verizon customer, what does my state's opt-in decision mean for me? Opting into FirstNet does not mean commitment to using the FirstNet network. A state's opt-in decision means that FirstNet and AT&T can now begin the process to build a public safety network in your state, but public safety customers are free to select any network. Verizon has already built and continues to operate the nation's largest and most reliable 4G LTE network. Our public safety customers can continue to leverage the reliability and trust that we've provided for decades.

Are priority and preemption services key indicators of having a more reliable network? Priority is designed to allow first responders to get through ahead of other users on the network. Preemption is a feature that allows us to automatically assign network resources to first responders over other commercial users in times of peak demand. One of the best defenses against network capacity overloads is a superior network. By way of example, 98% of Verizon's sites stayed operational during Hurricane Harvey. While other carriers celebrated the use of much needed preemption service offerings, we celebrated the fact that we didn't have to use these services to maintain connectivity for first responders.

Once I move my devices to the private core, are they there for good? You can move your devices into and out of the core as you feel is necessary.

Will the Verizon network be interoperable with the FirstNet network? Verizon is committed to interoperability and has proposed interoperable solutions to FirstNet.

Our SPOT product is brand new and acts as a portable mobile cellular site that provides temporary network and wireless coverage to locations where cellular coverage is minimal or compromised.

I promised to bring the answer back to that meeting and have it included in the minutes if at all possible.

Regarding the out of network requirement we use a satellite back-haul and will access the network from about anywhere, which will give first responders coverage during a crisis out of network. I thought that was his question however it may have had more to do with simply how much coverage it would offer. They say up to 1,500 feet depending on landscape, this would be the minimal expectation. If it were on top of a range I'm positive, it would extend out much further.

YELLOWSTONE COUNTY PRE-DISASTER MITIGATION PLAN KICK-OFF

Yellowstone County has hired Sr. Project Manager, Daphne Digrindakis of Tetra Tech to begin work on updating the five-year multi-hazard mitigation plan.

The plan will include hazards that can range from natural events to the possibility of disease outbreaks, transportation incidents and hazardous material releases.

Information will be solicited from first responders, county planners, residents with homes and businesses in disaster-prone areas, or first-hand experience dealing with hazards. Information will also be gathered from those organizations that respond to disasters, such as the Red Cross and the Salvation Army.

The process of updating the plan is expected to take about a year to complete with a first draft possibly done by October, 2018.

<p><u>NOTES:</u></p>	<p><u>FLOODING:</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Dry washes (Alkali Creek, Basin Creek) floods when after heavy thunderstorms or rapid snowmelt. USACE hydrographs can be used to model the 100-year flood. Basin Creek funnels into a narrow valley and there is a subdivision location there. Jim Kraft, former Yellowstone County DES, had identified a number of these dry washes as vulnerable areas. • Urban area of Billings downtown has been impacted by 2-inch rains. Billings Clinic has suffered extensive damage from surface flooding. • Banks of the irrigation ditch at Highland Golf Course collapsed flooding downtown before in heavy rain event prior to 1937. • Cove Creek and East Reach below Country Club is currently being mapped by FEMA contractors. May be available for PDM flood analysis. • Basement of Yellowstone Art Museum has flooded because of seepage through older foundation. • Limited storm water collection system exists through downtown Billings to manage sheet- flow flooding through urban area. • Pryor Creek drainage is problematic. During 2011 flood, Pryor to Huntley flooded to where it dumps into Yellowstone River inundating golf course, business, and several houses. One fatality resulted when saturated ground shifted and farmer got trapped under tractor.
	<p><u>WILDFIRE</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Need to identify method to dispose of fuel mitigated material so all of it doesn't have to travel long distances to come to landfill. Consolidation of material and local burn areas may be a solution. Possible mastication of material for composting. • Large acreage in wildland urban interface with many new subdivisions. Subdivision regulations could be strengthened to require defensible space and construction with fire-proof materials.
	<p><u>HAZARDOUS MATERIAL INCIDENTS/TRANSPORTATION ACCIDENTS</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Railroad accidents should be considered in PDM analysis. • Regional Haz-Mat Response Team in Billings used to rely on State and Federal funding but this source has dried up. Keeping team together with local funding that may only last two more years. May need to limit response area due to funding limitations. Need legislation for increased funding.
	<p><u>TERRORISM/VIOLENCE/CIVIL UNREST/CYBER SECURITY</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Health Medical Group. Hospitals have seen response increase due to local violence. • Cyber event in Lockwood recently when ransomware shut down the fire department's computer system.
